The Masks of Monsters, by Narayan Liu, is set in the late 1700s, when a young English nobleman, Darius Burke of Farnham, murders his father in revenge for his treatment of his family. Taking refuge from his deed in the forest, Darius meets a mysterious, winged being, who snatches him away from everything he knows. Surrounded by danger and wrapped around in political webs woven millennia before he was born, Darius faces the unknown from the moment he opens his eyes in the catacombs beneath Rennes, and there will be hard choices facing him if he wants to survive.

The Masks of Monsters offers a refreshing change from the glamorous vampire stereotype common to the genre, showcasing everything from vampires able to pass for human to skeletal, leathery-winged monstrosities drawn directly from medieval myth. The plot flirts with elements ranging from pre-Christian history to family in-fighting to the ethics of survival, but I found that the flurries of adjectives that punctuated the narrative, along with the occasional technical issues in the writing style, made it hard for me to stay in the story. However, for those looking for a vampire novel that breaks with the glitzy romance common to the genre, this novella is definitely worth the read.

I've known the author since we were in middle school and was pleasantly surprised to learn that he wrote a novella, which I only just now finally got round to reading. I love the concept. The characters are fascinating and engage in thought-provoking dialogue on revenge, remorse and other moral issues concerning the blurred lines between good and evil. As I understand, *The Masks of Monsters* is a sneak-peak of a more elaborate universe that Narayan is constructing. In the future I hope to learn more about the pasts of the characters introduced in this book and the world in which they live reside.

Now for the fine print. The edition I read, which I downloaded from Amazon in early 2015, is full of inexcusable grammatical errors. I spotted lapses in tense and misuses of "they're" vs "their", among other so-called writer's felonies. Most of these I shrugged off as careless mistakes, but what really roughened the reading experience was the way dialogue was formatted, making it extremely hard to follow who was saying what (i.e. "he said" was so often ambiguous). Similarly, multiple descriptions took the form "he [blank] his [blank]" where "he" and "his" referred to different people. These are totally understandable for a brand new writer--I know for a fact that Narayan is a bright dude and would never make these mistakes after a simple proofread. In fact, I'm going to give him the benefit of the doubt and assume that all has been rectified in subsequent editions.

All in all it's a promising start to a fascinating universe; I can't wait to see where Narayan takes it. Well done and keep it up, man.
