Romancing a Mystery by Evelyn Cullet is a slightly wacky, screwball romance wrapped in the flavour of a mystery novel. It's charming, light and a breezy read.

The novel tells the misadventures of Charlotte, Jane and Erin as the three embark on a vacation in the English countryside. A few wrong turns land them at an Earl's manor house, where they become unexpected houseguests when Erin becomes ill. Sparks fly between Charlotte and the somewhat older Earl of Bredon,

while Jane pursues the Earl's son, Peter. Add in a backdrop of an unsolved murder mystery with some minor mayhem, and romantic amusement ensues.

Romancing a Mystery is a solid, entertaining book, giving you just what you would want from a romantic novel. You get handsome men, plucky (if somewhat nutty) heroines and an appealing setting. The plot is fluffy, but straightforward, delivering the right notes where needed, pulling you into the story.

The characters are nicely rendered, generally coming across as real people, although there are one or two places where common sense -and manners- are stretched a tad. You do feel as if you might know these people and I have to say I loved the characters. However, considering some of the antics they indulge in the novel, I don't think I would invite them to be my houseguests.

Now, the ending might not suit some, but I thought it matched the novel. The book doesn't wrap things with a happily ever after, tied in a pink bow, but instead leaves the romance open with a promise of more to come.

I highly recommend this book to readers who enjoy a mix of cozy mystery and romance with moments of humour. On a personal note this American author has obviously visited England and has a sharp eye for details and I found it very entertaining to see my own country through a "foreigner's eyes."

Very disjointed and just plain odd. The characters were unappealing and seemed to always do the opposite of what would make sense. I'm still not sure why these 3 women would be traveling together as they all seem to dislike each other and then never really see each other again.

Then the "mystery" is not very mysterious, is resolved with too much ease, and when the heroine is lamenting that the bad guy isn't being punished enough, the hero tells her to just put it behind her so as not to ruin the night. Really? Sorry about your near death experience, but don't let it ruin the party?!?

Then the romance is disappointing. The heroine hates that her mother is always setting her up with older men, and who does she fall for? The guy old enough to be her father, who is kind of rude, is also resisting her for some unknown reason and has the romantic maturity of a twelve-year-old. Then when the heroine gets home she starts liking her new boss, but wait, is still in love with the "hero" from England.

Then there was the epilogue, which did what epilogues should never do. It undid whatever was done with the novel, made me hate the hero, heroine and wonder why I wasted my time.

There were so many inconsistencies and too much irrelevant information. I was determined to finish it, but this could have benefited from some beta readers and good editing.

Romancing a Mystery is a novel that is filled with unpredictable happenings from start to finish. As co-workers Jane, Charlotte, and Erin venture on a tour to England and northern Ireland, their hopes and expectations would be altered by the rental car getting stuck in a ditch. Call it fate or coincidence but with the cell phone getting no signal and a hard rain storm in their midst, they would walk to a museum-like mansion soon to discover it belonged to the aristocratic Earl of Bredon.

What was to be a hospital overnight stay for them would turn into an unforgettable week each of the woman would remember in her own unique significant way. With Jane in a quest for a mystery crime she can solve, she will discover the younger son of Duke, Albert "Albie" Chastain sharing the rumor of unresolved crime centuries ago. In a dating dispute between the Duke of Demshire and the Earl of Bredon the mystery would remain as to who was killed and whether the body was hidden somewhere within the house.

Gain a vision of this elegant house and each of the rooms, along with the mysterious portraits in which the "eyes" would seem to follow Charlotte. "Footsteps sounded in the hall. Hollow murmurings echoed through the gallery". The portrait and riddles of Malcolm Blake will lead to a finding in a wine cellar behind a mural. Discover how one week can unravel and unsettle a mystery, yet answers still remain in the balance:

--what was the white mist that hung in the air above the corpse?

--where did the servant James run to that tried to lock them in the room permanently?

--was it James mother that returned the necklace... Or someone else?

Along with great mystery is great romance that each of the woman would envelope themselves in. Jane would become infatuated with Lord Peter who is engaged. "I'm sure he's my soulmate. He doesn't act like he's engaged, so I don't think he's really going to marry that woman... Peter's in love with me". And Charlotte: "He alone [earl of Bredon] possessed that unexplainable something that touched her in a place she never knew existed."

Erin's weeklong pneumonia was not even close to being in vain as you will discover the doctor did far more for her than cure her physical infirmity.

Their return to the United States would leave Jane and Charlotte dissatisfied with their job and meager life. Discover how the "past "would be creatively memorable for Jane, how Charlotte would find herself in the crossroad of her life, and how Erin would eccentrically live out a fairy tale ending.

I describe this as clever, witty, and full of twists that come full circle in an emotionally satisfying work. Author Evelyn Cullet's passion for writing began in high school where it has now flourished into four novels. A lover of mysteries, she vacillates between reading writing and hosting authors on her writer's blog. You've got to check this book out along with some of her other works as I promise you will not be dissatisfied.
