I don't rate these books using my normal scale, instead I give most of them three stars. This isn't a Criticism of the book, simply my way of rating them as good for children.

I gave this one three stars only because my son likes it a lot and requests it often. My own personal rating for this one would be 2 stars (at best). It's not actually written by the Reys, but rather "in the style of." This may in fact be the case of most of the Curious George books at our library, I'm not sure how many of them were written and illustrated by the original creator(s).

There's a bit too much text and I don't feel like it flows very well. And while the dogs are cute--what kid doesn't like reading about tons of puppies?--I felt like the book missed the mark with George's problem-solving. The best George stories are the ones where George solves the problem in a specific way that only a monkey can, because he can climb or swing or hold things in his feet or whatever. In this case, he simply opens a door to find the missing puppy. Not super thrilling to me...but, like I said, my son has been requesting this one quite a bit lately, so clearly it's appealing to its target audience.

Curious George is always perfectly drawn. And I like the stories that are created around him. I just have difficulty with a monkey in captivity. And I find the man in the yellow hat a bit creepy. If I can set aside my initial reservations and prejudices, this book was an adorable story.

When I read this book to my five-year-old son, he saw Curious George as a five-year-old boy. He enjoyed the story, and I enjoyed the artwork.
