I received this book from the author Sara Shrieves from a discussion thread on Goodreads. This is the first book I have read from her.

There are quite a few characters in this. You have the main character Audrey, Audrey's father, Agnes who works in the shop, and their gay neighbour Bruce, who all go on a journey with Audrey to help find a cure. There's also Kirk, who is a good friend of Audrey's, and they develop a relationship throughout the story. Finally, you have a few members of a council who intends to eliminate Audrey because of what she is becoming.

Audrey is quite a fun character. She has occasional sarcastic remarks, is quite hilarious at times, and is a typical spunky young adult.

Free of explicit sensuality and only one instance of profanity, the only reason for the rating of 18+ would be-well, violence-lots of it.

Audrey is fifteen and has a devoted Dad nicknamed "Hulk," a neighbor-former babysitter Bruce who is an R.N. and joyfully Gay, and a best guy friend Kirk who is two years older. She is also a prude and sensually an innocent. Life turns very funky when on a repeated visit to Magic Edge witchcraft supply store she discovers an annex to the regular store, and while waiting for a custom spell to be crafted, inadvertently knocks over a jar-and begins the process of turning zombie.

Think of the old cheesy, campy zombie movies from the 80s and throw in a little vamp-ness, and you have 'Who is Audrey Wickersham?'. I honestly had NO idea what to expect when I began to read this book, but I guarantee that I didn't expect what I got! Don't get me wrong – this story was definitely cheesy and campy (see line 1, above), but it was also pretty funny and outrageous too. Definitely a fun read. So here goes.... Audrey Wickersham is a 15 year old girl (almost 16!) who is odd, quirky, and not really one to fit in at her high school. But this isn't really a high school drama....very little of the book actually plays out in her school, so you don't have to sit through boring recitations of school days gone by. Audrey likes to people watch, and one of her favorite places to go is a metaphysical shop called The Magick Eye. She has the kind of witchy obsession that only 15 year olds can have – she is interested in magic and spells and potions and whatnot (fascinated by it, really), but has never really had the courage to actually buy something in the shop. One day while in the store, a woman (Agnes) approaches her and asks if she is looking for something in particular....and off Audrey goes on her grand adventure.

Audrey bumps into a jar with something weird and squiggly in it, and it spills all over her; infecting her with little creatures called the Zomorwai. What are the Zomorwai, you may ask? Well, they are the creatures who carry/spread/are (not sure) the Zombie virus. That's right. Zombieism is a virus and it is spread by infectious worms. From Romania. With help from Audrey's dad, her neighbor Bruce, her hotty boy-crush Kirk and the woman Agnes who started it all, Audrey tries to find a way to cure – or if that doesn't work – deal with, being a mindless brain-eating zombie.

HI-larious. This book is along the same lines as Bruce Campbell in the 'Evil Dead' movie franchise....not going to win any Pulitzer prizes any time soon, but good clean fun with lots of campy good-time humor. Personally, zombies freak me out in a BIG way, and the cover for this book makes it seem like you're getting ready for some sort of crazy horror novel. This novel was a fast and funny read as far as I'm concerned; I wouldn't put it in my all-time favourites, but it definitely made me smile more than once, for its main character and her quirks first. Audrey's misfortune is absolutely appalling, yet she has somewhat of a humorous way of telling about it, when her attitude could've been much more angst-ridden (and thus probably more difficult to stand in the long run—that may be because I'm myself the kind of person who's cry for five minutes, then throw in bad jokes all the time just to deflect the fear and pain). She's also determined to take things into her own hands (even though this leads her to other mishaps), and not to let other people only try to figure out a solution.

Another thing I appreciated is the role played by her father: in a lot of novels, the protagonist's parents often get shoved out of the way very quickly, and the teenagers left to their own devices. Here, her father is clearly part of the plot, with a fierce desire to help and protect, proving his love for his daughter by the simple fact that, for starters, he's not rejecting her. And let's not forget Bruce, who I absolutely loved for his own quirks.

What may or may not undo this book for a lot of readers, I think, is its 'over the top/cheesy slash movie' feeling—in that either you like such tropes, or you don't. I'm usually at ease with those, especially when they're used on purpose, which seems to be the case here; but I suppose this would deter other people from enjoying this story. There was also Kirk's matter: the characters suffers, in my opinion, from being introduced too fast for who he is, and he would be more enjoyable if the reader could get to know him better before that.

I originally gave 3 stars to this novel, but truly, it was more like 3.5, and now that I'm writing this review, I've decided to up it to 4. It \*was\* a very entertaining story, and I like the author's take on zombies and on how they come to be created.

She is smart, makes good grades and liked by her teachers, has a good family, but she is searching for more. This leads her to The Magick Eye, a bookstore that specializes in all things of the metaphysical and enchanted sort.

Looking for her first spell to attempt, Audrey stumbles into a strange jar with living contents, Zomorwai worms. So who is Audrey Wickersham? In a few days, she is going to be a zombie.

Written from the lighthearted, sarcastic point of view of a teenager, *Who is Audrey Wickersham* is a coming of age story with a paranormal twist. She is searching for herself while fighting against a curse she did nothing to deserve. No sooner does she begin to think that she may understand where her life is headed, she is thrown another curve ball. However she knows her loving (very protective) father- affectionately known as Hulk- will always be by her side. Along with Bruce the drama queen babysitter, Agnes the gypsy from The Magick Eye, and Kirk the handsome friend with a secret of his own, Audrey's support team is a big dysfunctional family that functions exactly the way she needs it to. It is a wonderfully written relationship shared by these characters, each facing a challenge of their own during Audrey's ordeal.

From first kiss to first kill, Sara Shrieves allows us to travel with Audrey as she faces the everyday challenges of becoming a woman, along with some more unnatural urges. Shrieves captures that awkward time in our lives with sincerity and authenticity.

A great YA novel for teenagers who are looking for a more mature read. There are a few uses of four- letter words but nothing a fifteen year old would not hear or say. There are no sexual situations to address and the violence is not gratuitous, but just what is needed to describe the scene. I feel this would be a great book for a teenager who may not be interested in traditional YA novels and for anyone looking for a new take on a zombie story. It is certainly worth more than its \$0.99 price on Amazon. I hope to see more from Ms. Shrieves, perhaps another teen facing a supernatural challenge and maybe more from Audrey.
