It's a little overdone. Clearly this book is intended as a children's book, but I think even kids would have a hard time keeping up with all the jumping around and trying to play the "Can you figure out what just happened?" every other page. I understand the concept of this alternate world that the main character finds himself in but it is just toooo overdone and crams way too much diversity into the storyline. From Superheros of all kinds to the Snorks? From reality to cartoon animated cartoon characters? It just wasn't very easy to wrap your head around. It seemed like there was way too much put into the storyline without much direction how everything fit. Does that make sense? The last negative thing I have to say is that one of my biggest pet peeves about a story that starts a series is that when you finally get to the actual problem of the plot, the book ends. I don't just mean as in it's a hangover that you must read the next one but that the entire book is the prelude before you find the controversy, then the actual plot comes out on the last two pages and ends. That is not how a cliff hanger works. Each book in a series should be able to stand on its own with a beginning, middle and end. Then in the ending you can add a new twist that leaves you wanting more. This felt like a half of book.

On a positive note, the author, Henry Shel is a good writer. He has a great imagination and does draw you into the story enough that you WANT to figure out what's going on. The characters are very likeable and you really do want to know what happens next!

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
