This volume is slightly better than the last. The art continues to shine. As the series has gone on, the style of art has been quite eclectic which gives the story great variety. There are quite a few Boba Fett stories (despite the cover) in this volume and these work well in the shorter format. Unlike with a Jedi moral which is a common "Tale", a bounty hunter can have a quick sleight of hand to outmaneuver their opponent and the story still has a satisfying conclusion. I'm glad I kept going with this series and now there is only one question left. Can Volume 6 close out the series in style and earn all five stars? Only time will tell...

I usually don't bother with Star Wars comics mostly because I'm not a huge fan of the franchise and the writers for it are usually really crappy (Ian Edginton, W. Haden Blackman, Ron Marz? Pee-yeew!). But Amazon was having a blowout, selling Kindle editions of these trades for pennies, and I noticed this book had an amazing line-up of some of my favourite indie creators: Tony Millionaire, Jason, Rick Geary, Peter Bagge, James Kochalka and Gilbert Hernandez, so I bought this puppy.

This is a book of short stories that range from the classic trilogy to the universally reviled prequels. I was disappointed that these great artists couldn't do more with the material, though that's not to say they don't produce some interesting shorts. Tony Millionaire's story, George R. Binks, features Jar Jar's dad, a man who hates his retarded son and tries to kill him on numerous occasions. It was good for a chuckle and I'm glad it got published, Lucasfilm acknowledging the deep hatred fans have for the character. The ending is inspired too.

But really all of the stories are just ok – not good, not bad – and over all too soon. Jason's Darth Vader flubs his lines "Luke, I am your father", Rick Geary applies his true crime talents to Luke Skywalker in a tongue-in-cheek crime caper, and James Kochalka's Melvin Fett looks at Boba Fett's incompetent cousin who's also a mercenary – but comically bad at his job. Peter Bagge's Jar Jar comics are ok as he also goes after the dumb character's annoying personality and general brainlessness, while Gilbert Hernandez's Young Lando Calrissian is a nice looking but dull bait and switch story.

I suppose paying 77p for the lot wasn't bad but I wouldn't really recommend this even for fans of some of the creators. The novelty of seeing them apply their art styles and narrative voices to these enormously popular characters wears off pretty quick and the stories are, unfortunately, boring.

This collection of short tales ranges widely in setting (All are in the Star Wars universe but they cover a lot of time.), characters, and style of artwork. The level of seriousness goes from serious to silly. Boba Fett gets the spotlight in several stories.

Some of my favorite stories do not fall into the "real" Star Wars universe. I found the parody of the Breakfast Club to be fairly funny. I also enjoyed the story of Han and Chewie making an impact on Earth (loved the cameo in that one).

But overall, I can't say that most of the stories blew me away. They weren't bad, just not that memorable to me. I also didn't like a lot of the artwork which detracted from the story. I realize artwork style is very subjective though, so others might not have the same reaction as I did.

I'll be honest: the only reason I sought this one out was the "all-indie" final issue in this volume, featuring greats like Bob Fingerman, Tony Millionaire, and Gilbert Hernandez. Most of the jokes in their stories are stretched pretty thin, but it's still refreshing to see such visually subversive takes on the classic franchise. Unfortunately, getting there means slogging through the other three-quarters of the book. There were a few stories that piqued my interest, mostly because of the artists involved. Ben Templesmith offers a dark Jedi crime thriller that reads like "S7ven" in space, and Greg Tocchini brings his detailed eye to a tale of mad science gone wrong.

However, it's hard to imagine most of these other stories getting published with their characters swapped out for anyone else. For fans, that might not be so bad. But if your appreciation for the series is lukewarm or worse (like myself), it's hardly worth the effort.
