As the star rating implies, this book was okay, but....

First of all, the main character, Briley, really got on my nerves and, unfortunately, I found I couldn't summon up a lot of sympathy and liking for her. She was just too full of self-loathing, self-pity and negative emotions all the time. For a twenty-two-year-old woman, she certainly acted, talked and thought like a much younger person. I just didn't understand why she hated herself so much and thought no one in the world liked her when there was so much evidence to the contrary. She didn't seem all that bright sometimes, either, and had to have so much explained to her. Her petulant "Yeah, whatever", and the repetitive "meowed a cry" from Smokey, her cat, really became tiresome after a while. (view spoiler)

I did enjoy most of the interactions between Briley and Smokey and found their relationship to be quite sweet and loving. I've often wished I could comprehend and understand the thoughts of my dog and have the ability to carry on a conversation with her, so I thoroughly took pleasure in this concept of the book.

The world and the village of Maepole that Ms. Avory created for the story was fairly well done, but I'm not sure if I will visit it again any time soon. Perhaps, since this is a debut novel, the subsequent books may have improved in quality, so I might continue on with the series at some point in time.

This book came to me as a prize in a raffle at a the Fantasticon 2015 fantasy convention in Hull. I doubt I would've come across it otherwise and don't think I'd have read it. The novel is clearly aimed at young women and I suspect that many of them, especially cat lovers, will enjoy it.

The central character, Briley, is a young woman with a troubled background and an understandable tendency to moan and be overly critical of herself: not a surprising trait, given the way society often treats young women. She has a companion, Smokey, her cat, who she treats as her best friend. I enjoyed the snarky nature of the creature as it comments on her actions and converses with her once she's been thrust unwillingly into the life of a witch.

This fantasy tale has a good story and the central idea of an individual magicked into another world works quite well. But there is a good deal of repetition and several instances of misused words, as if the author has consulted a thesaurus without fully understanding the actual meaning of the chosen suggestions.

For all that, I read the book to the end and I don't do that if I'm not engaged. Briley, irritating and sometimes self-pitying as she is, did manage to hold my attention throughout the book. I had some sympathy for her and wondered what would happen.

This is the first in a series and, unlike many modern sets, this one does actually contain a fully formed story with beginning, middle and end and can be read as a standalone book. So, top marks to the author for that. I won't, however, be reading the sequels.

Many cat lovers and young women who enjoy their fantasy with romantic but non-erotic content will find this book satisfying. And there is a well told story here.

Since devoting more of my reading time I've found myself reading books in genres I wouldn't normally have considered, it's easier to take a gamble when you're only risking a couple of quid! The Spirit of a Witch is another one of those occasions and I'm glad I did because it is a fun read from a new author.

The story is about a young woman being ground down in the crunch of games development (something I can sympathise with :-)) who finds herself transported to another world. For the first chapter I was a bit unsure, but the story got going quite quickly after that.

The biggest downer for me was the main character, she is a bit of a moaner. In fairness she has a fair bit to moan about. Thankfully her cat comes to the rescue and this was the biggest surprise. I'm not a cat person, but Smokey is an excellent balance to Briley's insecurities.

The writing itself is well crafted and very well polished for a new author. My only slight complaint was the moments of peril didn't quite ring as strongly as they should. That is a minor complaint as the story itself is well paced and leaves a nice opening for the next in the series.

I adored this book (or books, as I forgot I had purchased the combined books 1 and 2 that is Volume 1. Full disclosure: I kept wondering why the story hadn't ended yet...)

Briley is a character I can absolutely relate to - a nerdy computer programmer who is awkward and introverted. She's also got a lot of issues with self-doubt stemming from her ability to always blame herself for everything that goes wrong.

And then she gets transported to another world! And, oh yeah - she's a witch. And her cat talks to her.

The first book focused on Briley's inclusion into this new fantasy world. There's a sickness going around, and Briley's newfangled ideas of boiling water to kill E. Coli suddenly make the witch a hero (hooray for modern science!). But not to everyone; there's a rotten Malfoy-esque family who hates witches and witchcraft. And they just keep popping up to threaten and annoy her.

I had a couple quibbles with the writing style - I felt like there were times when Avory repeated the same sentiment over and over again. "Oh, what are you doing?" "Nothing." "Oh, witchy stuff." "Smiles." happened as many times as I had the thought "Okay, we get it." I also was confused with Sebastian thing - but that had more to do with the break between the two books that went over my head. At times, it read like a really good young adult book (not a bad thing!) but then we got hints of more erotic that pushed it into the adult/new adult territory. I wasn't terribly sure that it was necessary, as I didn't feel it added anything to the story.

I would definitely recommend this book to fans of fantasy, mature young adult readers, and anyone looking for a place to call home.
